Please read below to better understand what was done.

A slow-release fertilizer was applied to your entire lawn. As the weather cools off, this is the perfect time of year to encourage the lawn to fill in. The weeds are no longer actively competing, and the cooler weather means less chance for disease.



weeds will send the control product to the roots along with the nutrient reserves and the root system will die off completely.

Any bare or thin areas of your lawn were seeded with a strong variety of grass seed. The Autumn weather is ideal for new seed growth, so those areas should begin to fill in over the next several weeks. Please see below for watering instructions.



We also selectively sprayed any weeds we may have seen. Since the weeds are beginning to send reserves to their root systems for the Winter, this is the perfect time to spray. The



Watering New Seed

Watering grass seed is much different than watering an established lawn. Your existing grass would probably be fine with very little water this time of year. Unfortunately, the same cannot be said of new seed.
